# 4-H DIRECTORY

The 4-H Leaders Council policy that parents and member should be aware of:

#### **CODE OF CONDUCT**

- Members should not use alcoholic beverages or other drugs at any 4-H function. Aspirin and other similar products and drugs prescribed by a physician are exceptions.
- Violation by a member shall result in the loss of 4-H privileges for the remainder of the 4-H year, including exhibiting at the county fair, participating in the livestock sale, and attending the state fair.
- Adult volunteer leaders should adhere to the same high standard expected of the members.

#### **CHAPERONING POLICY**

Chaperones for county functions must be recognized 4-H leaders. A recognized leader is an individual who
has successfully completed screening, leader training, and signed a 4-H Leader Agreement form (effective
October 1 of the current year). Non-recognized 4-H leaders must not have unsupervised access to 4-H youth.
This is particularly important for any overnight functions.

# **4-H AND FFA LIVESTOCK EXHIBIT RULES**

- All 4-H and FFA market and breeding swine, sheep, goat and beef entries must be submitted online, following the link at www.sublettecountyfair.com no later than 11:00PM on Friday, July 6, 2018. All poultry and rabbit entries must be completed online at no later than 11:00PM July 6, 2018. Youth needing assistance with the online entry system may receive help at either the fair office in Big Piney or the Extension Office in Pinedale.
- Any livestock including horses, rabbits, or chickens shown in the youth or open shows and staying overnight must have a health-check within ten days of the respective animal show. If anyone sees an animal with questionable health issues, the animal may be quarantined on the grounds until examined by a vet. The owner of the animal may be subject to any vet fees. Lisa Jones, DVM will make the final decision regarding the health of all animals. The fair board will not be responsible for any related expenses.
- 4-H and FFA swine exhibits must be on the grounds by 10:00AM on Wednesday, July 25. All other 4-H and FFA livestock exhibits including poultry and rabbits (excluding horses) must be on the grounds by noon Wednesday. Exhibitors violating this rule will not show or participate in the livestock sale. Exceptions are by emergency only. Decisions are made by at least five livestock committee members at weigh-in.
- Market swine will begin weigh-in at 10:00AM on Wednesday, July 25, followed by sheep and goats. No sheep and goats will be allowed in the wash area until swine showmanship has begun. Market beef will begin weigh-in at 12:00PM.
- Exhibitors must have proof of ownership (bill of sale) prior to fair. Brand inspections are required for beef, sheep, and goats. A bill of sale is required for swine.
- All sheep and goats (including wethers) must be identified with approved USDA Scrapie identification which includes an official USDA Scrapie Ear Tag OR LEGIBLE Tattoo accompanied by registry paperwork or a microchip with official veterinary application certification and reader.
- No bulls, boars, or buck goats allowed in showmanship.

- All exhibitors must show their own animal at both the Sublette County and the Wyoming State Fair. If a youth has multiple animals within a class at either venue, then the youth may designate FFA or 4-H youth to assist in exhibiting the animals. Furthermore, any youth exhibiting livestock at either the Sublette County or the Wyoming State Fair must be the animal's primary caretaker for the entire duration of the event. All pens must be cleaned and animals fed and watered on a daily basis by the exhibiting youth. Failure to do so will result in removal of the unattended animals from the fairgrounds.
- The Fair Veterinarian shall make the final determination at any time during fair when an animal is deemed unfit to be on fair grounds due to health issues. At such time a youth is informed that an animal must leave the fairgrounds, the fair veterinarian shall be accompanied by a fair board member and the FFA advisor and/or 4-H Extension Educator.
- All animals will remain tied or penned in the buildings.
- Animals used in showmanship must be owned and fitted by the exhibitor.
- There will be four classes of showmanship: Senior 4-H and FFA, Intermediate 4-H, Junior 4-H, and First Year 4-H.
- There will be no weigh-backs except at the discretion of the livestock committee. If any contestant uses artificial means, such as drenching, to make an animal meet requirements, that individual will be barred from competing at the fair. Should an animal not make weight, the contestant will still be allowed to show in a feeder class at the fair, but not to sell.
- Market steer classes will be determined by weight.
- It is recommended that there will be up to ten entries in a livestock class. Beyond ten entries, the entries will be broken such that there will be a minimum of five in each lot. If the class is divided by number, the division will be determined on scale order.
- Exhibitors must declare animals destined for state fair Friday evening, July 27, 2018 by 5:00PM.

# 4-H AND FFA LIVESTOCK EXHIBIT RULES CONTINUED

- An individual animal may be shown in more than one class providing the animal/exhibitor is eligible for the class.
- Market hogs weighing greater than 315 lbs. will be shown in a special class that is ineligible for the championship round.
- Market hogs weighing greater than 315 lbs. may sell in the sale ring only if the youth agrees to be paid only on 315 lbs.
- Any livestock deemed uncontrollable by the superintendent in charge will be excused from showing on the fairgrounds depending upon the severity of the situation.
- Youth are not allowed to advertise private treaty animals at the fair.
- STATE FAIR EXHIBITS: Only bona fide Wyoming 4-H members are eligible to compete for prizes offered in the 4-H Division of State Fair. A member must be enrolled in the project (at the State 4-H Office) in which he/she exhibits and the exhibit must be the result of the 4-H member's project during the current 4-H year. To be eligible for county support (entry and expense coverage) livestock projects must have received a purple or blue ribbon at county fair.
- Market Livestock Tagging: All youth entering market livestock in the Sublette County Fair must have that animal tagged by the appropriate program (4-H/FFA) by the tagging deadline for that species (Beef: February 1, 2018) (Sheep, Goats, Swine: June 1, 2018). Youth are allowed to tag as many animals as they wish. Additionally, a "floater" animal may be tagged as a family animal with a listing of all children's names included with it. The family animal can be tagged for all children of the family as long as the animals are being raised together. animal needs to be entered for show by each of the children by the fair deadline. At weigh-in time, the family can designate which child that animal is to be assigned to permanently. This animal is NOT eligible for state fair if tagged for all children. Alternatively, the "floater" animal may be tagged in an individual youth's name from the family, but still utilized by another youth in the family if necessary. In this case, the animal is only eligible for state fair if it is taken to state by the youth whom it is tagged under. If another family member utilizes the

- animal, it is not eligible for state fair. All other rules still apply to the family animal (i.e. tagging dates, weights, ownership, etc.).
- There will be a feeder class for all underweight animals at fair. Those animals will not be eligible to sell in the Junior Livestock Sale, but they will be judged in the feeder class as prospect animals and receive ribbon placings as such.
- Fitting Rule: A 4-H or FFA member is expected to fit their own animal at fair. However, in the interest of safety and the educational mission of the 4-H and FFA programs, a 4-H/FFA member may be assisted by others (i.e. member, parent, other adult). Assistance is defined as a learning situation where the teacher (helper) is teaching the 4-H/FFA member a technique in fitting or showing. The teacher is only allowed to show how; the member is expected to perform the majority of each technique and/or skill required. If the fair committee decides there is a violation of this rule, it may result in the disqualification of the animal and the forfeit of premiums and ribbons. If a 4-H/FFA member is found to be in violation of the fitting rule, he/she will not be allowed to show in any 4-H/FFA division at fair, including the showmanship contests. The fair committee for each livestock division will be the two livestock superintendents for the species, a fair board representative, the visor, and



# SUBLETTE COUNTY JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SALE RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1) Access to the Junior Livestock Sale is a privilege, not a right.
- 2) Market animals must have been grain fed. "Grass fat" animals will not be allowed participation in this premium market animal sale. The judge will also have the prerogative to declare an animal unfit for participation in the sale by awarding a white ribbon. All judges are clearly instructed that animals awarded white ribbons will not be allowed to consign in the Junior Livestock Sale.
- 3) Market beef over 1050 lbs, market lambs over 90 lbs, market swine over 230 lbs, and market goats over 60 lbs are eligible for sale. Smaller framed market beef that do not weigh 1050 lbs may also gain eligibility to the sale using the following formula: measured hip height x 22.5= minimum accepted market weight x .97 (3% allowance for weight loss due to stress) = minimum accepted weight.
- 4) Market swine over 315 lbs may sell in the Junior Livestock Sale only if the youth agrees to be paid only on 315 lbs.
- 5) A member may sell two animals of the same species if they have the Grand and Reserve Champion animal in that species. A member with a Grand Champion animal may sell a second animal of another species in addition to their Grand Champion animal. No member may sell more than two animals under any situation in any given year.
- 6) There will be at least six meetings for a 4-H project member, of which the member must attend at least 50% (three). This attendance will be certified by leaders.
- 7) Members must own the animal by the ownership deadline (February 1 for market beef and June 1 for sheep/goat/swine).
- 8) All 4-H and FFA members must have completed a Youth Quality Assurance Level I program their first year in a market livestock project. All members must complete an additional YQA each year until all three levels have been completed.
- 9) Participants must have shown the animal in the junior market livestock show at the fair.
- 10) Checks will not be issued to participants until all buyers have paid the sale association.
- 11) Members will not receive their checks until they have submitted an addressed, stamped "Thank-You" to their buyer. 4-H members must submit proof of thank-you to the Extension Office no later than

- August 27, 2018. Proof can be a photo of the thank-you card or a copy of the thank-you card. FFA members will receive their sale checks from the FFA advisor once all FFA requirements are completed. For those members that run "thank-you" ads in the newspaper, a hand written "thank-you" note written to your buyer must still be provided to the Extension Office. Newspaper "thank-you" ads are not required.
- 12) There will be a 2% commission retained by the sale association on the sale price.
- 13) Consignors may pick and choose which animal they will sell. There is no requirement to sell champions.
- 14) Once sold, the animal belongs to the buyer. Sale suggests consignor accommodate buyer's needs.
- 15) The sale association will bear no responsibility for private treaty animals; sales, transportation etc.
- 16) If a consignor does not have the animal present when animals are scheduled to be transported to slaughter (with the exception of pre-designated 4-H or FFA state fair delegate animals), the consignor is agreeing to assume all further responsibility for the animal including slaughter and delivery of product to the buyer.
- 17) All swine, sheep and goats sold through the Junior Livestock Sale will be left on fairgrounds property and hauled to slaughter after the sale unless other arrangements have been made with the buyer. No other of these species may be left in the livestock barn after the sale.
- 18) For all market beef sold through the sale, the consignor agrees to follow instructions given prior to fair which may include taking the animals home until a designated date and keeping them on current grain rations until the animal arrives at the designated location for pick up.
- 19) It is the member's responsibility to respond to request for promotion information.
- 20) The sale association will pay brand inspection fees.
- 21) Members must reserve state fair privilege prior to sale.
- 22) The sale association encourages buyers to make payment on sale day and will send invoices within the week.
- 23) The sale association may assess late payment charges on outstanding accounts (18% APR).
- 24) All rabbits must be dressed on delivery to purchaser.
- 25) Members MUST inform the sale association if they have alternate plans for slaughter.

# EQUINE / HORSE DIVISION 1514

# MONDAY | JULY 23 | 8:00AM TUESDAY | JULY 24 | 8:00AM AGCENTER

#### **Section 1: General Information**

- The junior equine show is limited to 4-H and FFA members.
- The junior equine show will be held Monday, July 23 and Tuesday, July 24 starting at 8:00AM both days.
- All junior horse show entries must be made online following the link at www.sublettecountyfair.com no later than Friday, July 6, 2018 at 11:00PM. If you do not have access to a computer with internet, entries may be made online by visiting the fair office or the Sublette County Extension Office in person and someone will assist you.
- Be sure to enter the correct age group.
- Horses should be on the grounds and ready to show at 8:00AM sharp.
- Vaccinations are strongly recommended to be current before arriving at the Sublette County Fair. Recommended vaccinations include: West Nile Virus, EWT, Rhino, Influenza, and Potomac Horse Fever. It is recommended that you consult with your veterinarian or animal health supplier to determine your vaccination program.
- Current certificates of veterinary health inspections are required for all stalled equine and must be presented to the horse show secretary upon arrival at the show. Certificates must have been written within seven days of the horse show. All out-of-state horses must be tested negative to the AGID (Coggins) test for EIA within 12 months prior to entry.

#### **Section 2: Policies**

- The show will be run according to the current Sublette County Fair Book, Wyoming Junior Horse Rule Book, and the 4-H Equine Competition Guide.
- Exhibitor is responsible for the accuracy of the entry. Errors can constitute an ineligible entry.

- Any horse suspected of ill health may be dismissed from the fairgrounds with veterinarian recommendation.
- Members must be safety certified on any horse they enter and for every event they enter with that horse. In the event a member is unable to show the horse they have entered, a horse substitution may be made on show day provided the member is safety certified on that horse and the member's leader and /or veterinarian confirms the entered horse is unable to be shown for health reasons.
- Wearing of equestrian helmets is strongly encouraged.
- In the interest of safety, an exhibitor's horse may be saddled, bridled, and tack change made by someone other than the exhibitor. When an exhibitor needs assistance, a parent, 4-H leader, FFA advisor, junior leader, and/or friend is encouraged to provide that assistance and coaching prior to entering the arena.
- Absolutely no mistreatment of animals will be tolerated.
- Contestants and other persons may approach the judge with questions at the conclusion of the show each day.

#### **Section 3: Rules**

- All contestants must be checked in both days of the horse show no later than thirty minutes prior to the start of their first class. Upon check in parents and youth must sign the FFA & 4-H junior horse show release which states: "We hereby give permission for our son/daughter, above named, to participate in any or all events in the 2018 4-H & FFA Junior Horse Show in connection with the 2018 Sublette County Fair, and hereby assume all risk of personal injury and property damage for and on behalf of our son/daughter arising out of his/her participation therein and hereby agree to hold and save harmless the sponsors and the horse show manager, and any other individual, organization, or firm connected with such event, from liability and responsibility for personal injury or property damage that may be suffered by our son/daughter during his/her participation in such contest and form any liability of any kind that may arise while said program is being carried out in so far as our son/ daughter, above named, is concerned. This agreement is made in consideration of his/her being permitted to participate in the 4-H & FFA Junior Horse Show. We, the parents and participants, agree to abide by all rules of conduct outlined by the Sublette County Fair Board as printed in the 2018 Sublette County Fair Book."
- 4-H exhibitors must have a Horse Safety Certification filed in the county extension office as of July 6, 2018 and FFA exhibitors must have a Horse Safety Certification filed in the fair office as of July 6, 2018 for any horse to be eligible for the Sublette County Fair.
- Exhibitor not present for the last call into the arena will be denied entry into the class.
- Dress code for all 4-H exhibitors at the Junior Horse Show will be black or blue jeans and a plain white, long-sleeved, western shirt with a collar or a Roper 4-H shirt. FFA members must be in official dress. This does not apply for English riding classes, which require English attire.
- Unsportsmanlike conduct (i.e. inappropriate language/actions) by an exhibitor may be cause for immediate disqualification of the exhibitor from the show, at the judge's discretion.
- Unsportsmanlike conduct (i.e. inappropriate language/actions) by a parent, leader, or others may be cause for immediate removal of the person from the Sublette County Fairgrounds at the discretion of the Fair Board.

- Exhibitors are limited to <u>one</u> horse per class for all showmanship and equitation classes. For all other classes, an exhibitor may enter two horses, only if one is an aged horse and the other is 4 years and under. Points for the all-around award will be based on the placing of the <u>youth</u> in the class and will not be dependent on youth/horse combination. In the even a youth places in an event with two horses, they will receive points for the highest placing only.
- First Year Showmanship: This is for exhibitors in their first year of the horse project, and eight, nine, or ten years old. Participants who enter the first year showmanship class are not eligible to become state fair delegates. If a first year member wishes to compete for a chance to be the state fair delegate, they must enter the junior showmanship division. The exhibitor may NOT enter both classes.
- The first year showmanship class will NOT count towards the All-Around.
- Walk-trot classes will NOT count towards All-Around.
   Exhibitors may not enter both walk-trot and regular classes.
- Halter classes will not count toward the All-Around.
- All cattle classes are open to all youth who have passed the safety endorsement test. There will be a separate "cattle class" certification required for youth entering these classes. The 4-H program will provide at least one opportunity for youth to attend a certification event with cattle. Members entering cattle classes that are not certified will be scratched from the classes by show staff. All entrants in stock classes will pay a \$25 stock charge no later than check in. Stock fees MUST be paid and will NOT be refunded if exhibitor scratches the class. Checks should be made payable to Sublette County Fair Board or SCFB. If entrants are team roping only they will pay a stock charge of \$10 per entry / horse to a maximum of \$30.
- Each exhibitor/horse combination will be assigned exhibit numbers by the horse show secretary. The exhibitor is required to display the correct number when showing.
- For classes requiring a partner (team roping and ranch sorting), the entrants partner must be listed on the entry, otherwise entrants will be removed from the class. Participants MUST be entered with a partner of the same age group or they will receive NO points towards all-around.
- Contestants may enter the team events twice, but with different partners. If time allows, exhibition runs may be allowed.
- There are stalls available for overnight use if needed. All reservations for overnight stalls must be made through the fairgrounds office. Please contact Brianne Brower at 307-276-5373 to reserve a stall.
- There will be All-Around awards given in each age division.

# 4-H & FFA ROUND ROBIN SHOWMANSHIP CONTEST SENIOR & INTERMEDIATE CONTESTS FRIDAY | JULY 27 | 4:30PM

#### **GENERAL INFORMATION**

- The Round Robin Showmanship contest is an avenue for 4-H and FFA members to learn about other species of livestock. Each Round Robin Showman will not only be judged on the fitting and showing of their own animal, but also on their abilities in showing other species of livestock.
- Belt buckles will be awarded to the Grand and Reserve Champion Round Robin Senior Showmen. A certificate for an embroidered jacket will be awarded to the Grand and Reserve Champion Round Robin Intermediate Showmen.
- The Sublette County Junior Livestock Sale Association will award a \$200 scholarship to the winner of the Senior Round Robin contest and a \$100 award to the Reserve Champion. The scholarship will be paid out after the fair of the youth's senior year and is to be used towards furthering their education with any post-secondary training.
- The senior contest is open to senior 4-H members (14-18) and FFA members who qualified in their respective showmanship contests: beef, lamb, swine, horse, and goat. The intermediate contest is open to intermediate 4-H members (11-13).
- Eligible contestants will be contacted after qualifying with any details on time, locations, and any additional information.
- The intermediate contest is not a 4-H supported event, therefore the 4-H program accepts no liability for the contest.

#### **RULES**

- The top two senior and intermediate showmen (4-H or FFA, grand champion and reserve champion) from the following livestock showmanship contests: beef, swine, horse, sheep, and goat, will be eligible to compete in the round robin.
- In the event a member qualifies in more than one contest, he will compete in the round robin with the first animal he/she qualified with, allowing the second-place contestant in the second contest to move up, with the exception of goat and sheep.
- The top showman in goat and sheep will be required to show in that class and, if they have previously qualified in another species, the second-place contestant in that species will move up. The contestant will fit their own animal for show.
- Members must show the same animal they exhibited in the original division showmanship contest.
- There will be one judge for each species; however, the judges will confer on the fitting portion of the contest and give one total score per contestant.
- The judges will score each contestant up to ten points for fitting; these points will be used only for tie-breaking.
- The contestants will be showing each species of animal for five minutes. The judges will give up to ten points.
- Contestants must qualify in their contest in order to compete in the round robin. Also, judges will be picked prior to the fair and scorecards will be made.

#### **RULES**

- The "household pet" cat is of mixed breed or unknown decent.
- A purebred cat is one belonging to a recognized breed with characteristics maintained through generations of unmixed descent; may be registered with a recognized registry.
- Kittens must be at least four months old and not older than eight months of age. Adult cats are older than eight months of age. Because of susceptibility to disease, no kitten under four months of age will be accepted for competition.
- No pregnant or nursing cats may be entered.
- All cats and kittens must have their claws clipped.
   Declawed cats may enter the show and will not be counted down for declawing.
- Do no enter your cat if you feel it will not be easily handled by the judge.
- Each cat or kitten must be wearing a harness or collar (not a safety collar) and a leash. The exhibitor must always wear the leash on their wrist for safety reasons.
- Exhibitors must furnish their own carpet square during judging. Exhibitors must provide a proper cage or carrier for their cats / kittens. Exhibitors must bring their own litter and litter box.
- All exhibitors should wear long sleeve shirts or blouses with trousers or skirts. No shorts.

#### **HEALTH REOUIREMENTS**

- Cats must have current rabies and distemper shots.
   It is strongly suggested, but not mandatory, that all entries have the combination vaccinations, plus feline leukemia. Vaccinations should not be received within three weeks prior to the show. Health certificates are required.
- Cats found to be ill or with parasites (fleas, ear mites, etc.) will not be allowed to show and will be dismissed from the grounds.
- No cat or kitten may enter the show if there is any (feline) infectious or contagious disease in the household within three weeks prior to the show date.

#### **RULES**

- All dogs must be at least six months of age by May 1 to compete at the 4-H Dog Show and one year of age by May 1 for agility classes.
- Youth should have a copy of their 4-H Dog ID form submitted by May 1 to the Extension Office.
- All animal entries of bonafide Wyoming origin must be accompanied by an official health certificate issued at the point of origin by an accredited veterinarian. Certificates for dog entries must show current immunization as per state veterinary guidelines.
- All dogs must be on leash (excluding competition) and under control at all times. Dogs must not be taken in areas where livestock are unloading.
- Vicious dogs will be dismissed from the ring and must be removed from the premises.
- Females in season will be allowed in classes. However, they will go through at the end of all classes.
- Spayed, monorchid, and neutered dogs may be shown without judging discrimination.
- Dogs must be clean and well groomed.
- The show committee reserves the right to ask anyone violating these rules to leave.
- No class will be held up for a contestant in a different show.
- Entries for rally and agility classes will need a current Wyoming 4-H Jump Height card at check-in to verify correct class entries.

# **Division 1517: Dog Show Obedience RULES**

- A 4-H member may compete in only one obedience class per dog, with a total maximum of two entries (dogs). Their first dog is referred to as the "A" dog. The other is referred to as the "B" dog for class entries.
- The first-year beginner novice class is for members who are in their first year of the dog project, not the first year with a new dog. It is designed as a training class for members who do not feel competent to start

- in the On Leash class. Members may compete in the first year class only once.
- An exhibitor who competes in the A groups with their first dog stays in the A groups with that dog for each level. The same is true for the B groups and levels. A member advances from On Leash A to Novice A. Same applies for moving in B classes.
- A 4-H exhibitor with a dog shown previously in obedience classes by another 4-H member or a dog that has a title from another organization or has at least three qualifying scores from the designated annual county 4-H show must show the dog by these guidelines:
  - Junior and Intermediate age exhibitors may move back or down one level
  - Senior age exhibitors must show the dog at the highest level the dog has achieved
- A dog receiving a qualifying score of at least 170 points at the designated annual county 4-H show may advance the following year to the next higher class but must advance after receiving 3 qualifying scores from the designated annual county 4-H show. Once the higher level of obedience is selected for the dog, the member may not drop back to the lower level with the same dog.
- High in trial will be calculated on the basis of the raw qualifying score plus five additional points with each increase in level of difficulty.
- Score Sheets: The Wyoming 4-H dog score sheets were designed for the benefit of 4-H members. They are intended as guides for judges. Judges use their discretion in deciding the seriousness of errors.
- All dogs must enter and leave the show ring and compete with a leash.
- Bait and/or toys are not allowed in the obedience competition.
- Dogs soiling or urinating in the ring during judging will be disqualified and receive no score.
- Males and females will be shown in the same class.
   Females in heat will be shown last in the class and must be kept away from the obedience ring until call time.

- Exhibitors entering more than one dog in any class may be assisted only by another 4-H member (from the same county, if possible), if the dogs must be shown at the same time.
- Classes 012-019 will be judged according to AKC standards, but it is not necessary that dogs be registered; they must be purebred - both animal parents of the same breed.
- Classes 020 and 021 are for cross-bred dogs (parents of different breeds) and will be judged according to the predominant breed characteristics and/or soundness, gait, condition, and grooming.

- A dog receiving a qualifying score of at least 75 points at county 4-H show may advance the following year to the next higher class but must advance after receiving 3 qualifying scores from the designated county 4-H show. Once the higher level in agility is selected for the dog, the member may not drop back to the lower level with the same dog.
- Youth, with a dog shown in previous years by another 4-H member or a dog that has a standard agility title from another organization, or has received three qualifying scores from the designated annual county 4-H show, must show the dog under these guidelines:
  - Junior and Intermediate aged 4-H youth may move "back" or "down" one level.
  - Senior aged 4-H youth must show the dog at the highest level that the dog has achieved.
  - All dogs must enter and leave the ring on a leash.
  - Level 1: Dogs will run on a leash six foot in length.
     Level 2: Dogs must run off leash or with a tab no longer than six inches. Collars must be of a flat, buckle variety with nothing hanging from it such as tags.
  - Bait is not allowed in agility competition.
  - Dogs in season will run at the end of each class.
  - A time for all handlers (only) to familiarize themselves with the course they are competing in will be established and announced.
  - Fastest times will be used to break ties on scores at all levels.



- All 4-H members bringing static exhibits to fair are encouraged to attend an interview with the judge to present what
  they learned. Interview judging will begin at 9:00AM on Friday, July 20, 2018. Each member will be designated a
  specific time to meet with the judge and as much as possible should adhere to that schedule. If a member is unable
  to attend interview judging they may still have their exhibit judged, but should make appropriate arrangements to have
  the item to the Commercial Building no later than 12:00PM on July 20.
- Due to the absence of interview judging at the state fair, the accompaniment of a brief explanation with your project may help the judge when assigning a ribbon placing. Points to consider may include: process, tools used, skills learned, goals achieved, and additional help from others.
- Because 4-H promotes a learning experience associated with project enrollment, entries are evaluated within the context of the division in which they are entered (i.e. entry in leathercraft is evaluated on leathercraft skills).
